 Children are already learning at birth, and they develop and learn at a rapid pace in their early years. This provides a critical foundation for lifelong progress, and the adults who provide for the care and the education of young children bear a great responsibility for their health, development, and learning. Despite the fact that they share the same objective - to nurture young children and secure their future success - the various practitioners who contribute to the care and the education of children from birth through age 8 are not acknowledged as a workforce unified by the common knowledge and competencies needed to do their jobs well. *Transforming the Workforce for Children Birth Through Age 8* explores the science of child development, particularly looking at implications for the professionals who work with children. This report examines the current capacities and practices of the workforce, the settings in which they work, the policies and infrastructure that set qualifications and provide professional learning, and the government agencies and other funders who support and oversee these systems. These detailed recommendations create a blueprint for action that builds on a unifying foundation of child development and early learning, shared knowledge and competencies for care and education professionals, and principles for effective professional learning. Young children thrive and learn best when they have secure, positive relationships with adults who are knowledgeable about how to support their development and learning and are responsive to their individual progress. *Transforming the Workforce for Children Birth Through Age 8* offers guidance on system changes to improve the quality of professional practice, specific actions to improve professional learning systems and workforce development, and research to continue to build the knowledge base in ways that will directly advance and inform future actions. The recommendations of this book provide an opportunity to improve the quality of the care and the education that children receive, and ultimately improve outcomes for children.

 Decades of research have demonstrated that the parent-child dyad and the environment of the family—which includes all primary caregivers—are at the foundation of children's well-being and healthy development. From birth, children are learning and rely on parents and the other caregivers in their lives to protect and care for them. The impact of parents may never be greater than during the earliest years of life, when a child's brain is rapidly developing and when nearly all of her or his experiences are created and shaped by parents and the family environment. Parents help children build and refine their knowledge and skills,

charting a trajectory for their health and well-being during childhood and beyond. The experience of parenting also impacts parents themselves. For instance, parenting can enrich and give focus to parents' lives; generate stress or calm; and create any number of emotions, including feelings of happiness, sadness, fulfillment, and anger. Parenting of young children today takes place in the context of significant ongoing developments. These include: a rapidly growing body of science on early childhood, increases in funding for programs and services for families, changing demographics of the U.S. population, and greater diversity of family structure. Additionally, parenting is increasingly being shaped by technology and increased access to information about parenting. Parenting Matters identifies parenting knowledge, attitudes, and practices associated with positive developmental outcomes in children ages 0-8; universal/preventive and targeted strategies used in a variety of settings that have been effective with parents of young children and that support the identified knowledge, attitudes, and practices; and barriers to and facilitators for parents' use of practices that lead to healthy child outcomes as well as their participation in effective programs and services. This report makes recommendations directed at an array of stakeholders, for promoting the wide-scale adoption of effective programs and services for parents and on areas that warrant further research to inform policy and practice. Excerpt from *Child Care and Child Welfare: Outline for Study* From institutions that are offering courses for the training of vocational teachers of home economics there has been a very general demand for source material which could be used as the basis of instruction in child care and child welfare. This demand comes because of the emphasis that is now placed upon child care as an

important part of the vocational training for home making. The Federal Board for Vocational Education is charged with the duty of making studies, investigations, and reports which will be of assistance to the States in the establishment and conduct of vocational schools and classes. When deemed advisable, these studies and reports may be made in cooperation with or through other Government departments interested in similar lines of work. One of the chief functions of the Children's Bureau of the Department of Labor is to make studies and investigations in the field of child care and child welfare. Through a cooperative arrangement between that bureau and the Federal board for Vocational Education this bulletin has been prepared. The bulletin deals with the important phases of childhood and is published with the hope that it may serve to stimulate the right kind of instruction in child care as a part of the training for vocational teachers of home economics. These outlines are not prepared for use directly as lessons. They are not in lesson form, but are published as source material from which the instructor may make her own course. Many of these outlines will be found to overlap, and it may be that certain subjects are not presented, or at least not given sufficient emphasis. Occasionally slight differences of opinion will be found to exist, for authorities are in disagreement on some of the important points discussed. Both the Children's Bureau and the Federal Board will welcome frank criticism and constructive suggestions which may lead to an improvement of the teaching of this subject, both in the colleges and in vocational schools of less than college grade. The preparation of this material has been undertaken by the Children's Bureau of the Department of Labor, under the direction of Dorothy Reed Mendenhall, M.
