Mexican Karismata  
chronicles the life of  
Francisca de los Angeles  
(1674-1744),  
the daughter of a poor  
Creole mother and  
mestizo father who  
became a renowned holy  
woman in her native city  
of Querätaro, Mexico,  
during the high Baroque  
period. As a precocious

young visionary and later  
as the headmistress of an  
important religious  
institution for women,  
Francisca actively partook  
in the project to revitalize  
the Catholic cult in New  
Spain's northern regions  
led by her mentors, the  
Spanish missionaries of  
the Congregation for the  
Propagation of Faith. Her  
copious correspondence,  
containing hundreds of  
unedited letters,  
documents the personal  
experience of popular  
Catholicism during the  
high Baroque period in  
New Spain. Francisca's  
journey to God did not  
follow prescribed  
hagiographical guidelines,  
drawing its inspiration  
instead from an eclectic  
mix of the doctrines of the  
Counter-Reformation,  
medieval spirituality, and  
local traditions. Her  
ecstatic apostolate to the  
dead and living often  
bordered on heresy but  
found acceptance and  
came to fruition under the  
protection of Querätaro's  
ecclesiastical and secular  
elite. Her life shows how  
mystic rapture and  
sociability joined in this  
colonial variation of Early  
Modern Catholicism and  
demonstrates the  
remarkable vitality and  
openness of urban

spirituality in the New  
World.

Treating buildings as bodies, Annabel Jane Wharton writes biographies of symptomatic structures in order to diagnose their pathologies. The violence of some sites is rooted in historical trauma; the unhealthy spatial behaviors of other spaces stem from political and economic ruthlessness. The places examined range from the Cloisters Museum in New York City and the Palestine Archaeological Museum (renamed the Rockefeller

Recognizing that a study of pathological spaces would not be complete without an investigation of digital structures, Wharton integrates into her argument an original consideration of the powerful architectures of video games and immersive worlds. Her work mounts a persuasive critique of popular phenomenological treatments of architecture. Architectural Agents advances an alternative theorization of buildings' agency—one rooted in buildings' essential materiality and historical formation—as the basis for her significant intervention in current debates over the boundaries separating humans, animals, and machines.

This is a history of the Enlightenment--the rights-oriented, formalist, secularizing, freedom-inspired eighteenth-century movement that defined modern Western law. But rather than members of a cosmopolitan Republic of Letters, its principal protagonists are non-literate, poor, and

enslaved litigants who sued their superiors in the royal courts of Spain's American colonies.

Despite growing evidence of the Hispanic world's contributions to Enlightenment science, the writing of history, and statecraft, the region is conventionally believed to have taken an alternate route to modernity. This book grapples with the contradiction between this legacy and eighteenth-century Spanish Americans' active production of concepts fundamental to modern law. The Enlightenment on Trial offers readers new insight into how Spanish imperial subjects created legal documents, fresh interpretations of the intellectual transformations and legal reform policies of the period, and comparative analysis of the volume of civil suits from six regions in Mexico, Peru and Spain. Ordinary litigants in the colonies--far more often than peninsular Spaniards--sued superiors at an accelerating pace in the second half of the eighteenth century. Three types of cases increased even faster than a stunning general rise of civil suits in the colonies: those that slaves, native peasants and women

initiated against masters, native leaders and husbands. As they entered court, these litigants advanced a new law-centered culture distinct from the casuistic, justice-oriented legal culture of the early modern period. And they did so at precisely the same time that a few bright minds of Europe enshrined new ideas in print. The conclusion considers why, if this is so, the Spanish empire has remained marginal to the story of the advent of the modern West.

In so doing, *Urban Slavery in Colonial Mexico* advances a new understanding of how, when, and why transatlantic and transpacific merchant networks converged in Central Mexico during the seventeenth century. As a social and cultural history, it also addresses how enslaved people formed social networks to contest their bondage. Sierra Silva challenges readers to understand the everyday nature of urban slavery and engages the rich Spanish and indigenous history of the Puebla region while intertwining it with African diaspora studies.
